



One notable feat recorded since the last edition of UNIMED Echo is the commissioning of the School of Public Health (SPH) of the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo. Once again, the University blazed the trail by becoming the first Nigerian

university with a standalone campus for Public Health undergraduate and postgraduate studies.

The Governor of Ondo State and Visitor to the University, Arakunrin Oluwarotimi Akeredolu, SAN along with other dignitaries present at the epoch-making event, laid the foundation for Hon. and Dr. Mrs Abiola Makinde's Health Centre, and also flagged off the Centre for Herbal Medicine and Drug Production, all at the SPH campus in Bolorunduro, Ondo State.

Another noteworthy development in the University is the commissioning of a Molecular Biology Laboratory of the Centre for Molecular Biosciences and Medical Genomics, to facilitate the diagnosis of COVID-19, Lassa fever and other infectious diseases.

The **BIG news** of this edition is the full accreditation of the Bachelor of Nursing Science programme of the University by the Nursing and Midwifery Council of Nigeria (NMCN). The full accreditation status is for a period of five (5) years with a yearly intake of seventy-five students, representing a 50% increase in the

total number of candidates approved for the programme.

Among other milestones recorded by the University, this edition also features a spotlight on the National Workshop on Space Technologies and Health, an event jointly organized by the University and the Centre for Atmospheric Research of the National Space Research and Development Agency (CAR-NASRDA).

My hope is that you will spare some time to read the contents of this fourth edition of UNIMED Echo, which has been carefully compiled to keep you abreast of the trail blazing and other various achievements in the University. Thank you.

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UNIMED INAUGURATES NIGERIA'S FIRST FULL-FLEDGED SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH

- First in Nigeria with a standalone campus
- Take-off with renowned experts in Public Health

History was made on Thursday 6th May, 2021 as the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State becomes the first Nigerian University to establish a School of Public Health with a dedicated campus.

The campus, which is located at Bolorunduro in Ondo East Local Government Area, was commissioned by the State Governor, Arakunrin Oluwarotimi Akeredolu, SAN amidst pomp and ceremony. It boasts of an Administrative Block, Digital Skills Laboratory, Lecture Rooms, Public Health Library, an ICT Centre, a Public Health Skills Centre, Environmental Health Museum, Community Health Skills Room among others.

Addressing dignitaries at the event, the Vice-Chancellor, UNIMED, Ondo, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi went down the memory lane on efforts to establish the School.

"The journey towards the establishment of a School of



Public Health was initiated by my illustrious predecessor and first Vice-Chancellor of our University, Prof Friday Okonofua, FAS, who convened a meeting of selected stakeholders for that purpose on 11th October 2016 and formally constituted a 12-person Board for the School on 23rd July 2018, of which I was privileged to have been a member," he narrated.

Prof. Fatusi who is also a Professor of Public Health left no stone unturned towards the fulfillment of the dream of the University.

"Coming on board on 10th March 2020 as the Vice Chancellor, the actualisation of the School of Public Health agenda, as may be expected, was one of my greatest priorities but the resources and facilities to take off sounded like an impossible hurdle to cross, at

least for a while, until what I personally titled, "The Bolorunduro miracle!," the VC said.

Fatusi affirmed that the University of Medical Sciences, Ondo UNIMED is the first Nigerian University to dedicate a whole campus to the study of Public Health.


He said: "Just as our University is the first specialised University of



Health and Medical Sciences in the country, this School stands in a class of its own in the world of public health training facilities in Nigeria. While the Nigerian university system has several departments and one or two

faculties focused on Public Health, this new school, for all practical purposes, can rightly be described as the first full-fledged School of Public Health in Nigeria."





The VC noted that the School is fortunate to have leading experts in the world of Public Health as pioneer Staff. This array of experts include Prof. Wasiu Olalekan Adebimpe (Dean), Prof. Emmanuel Oladipo Otolorin, Prof. Michael Chiemeli Asuzu, Dr. Yetunde Winifred Olagbuji, Dr. Olugbenga Osunmakinwa, Dr. Stephen Fagbemi, and Dr. Tuoyo Kennedy Okorosobo. Others faculties include Dr. Aderonke Fagbemi, Dr. Francis Akanbiemu, Prof. Olumide Ogundahunsi, Prof. (Engr.) Ife Adewumi, Prof. Chima Onoka, among others. He said the team has laid a solid foundation for the take-off of the series of programmes in the School.

"The School is structured in the mould of the leading public health schools in the world. With its five (5) academic Departments along with six (6) specialised multi-disciplinary Centres and an Institute devoted to Community Health Development, this school is poised to rapidly advance public health scholarship, science

and practice in Nigeria and make relevant contributions to relevant regional and global agenda," he stated.


Prof. Fatusi lauded Ondo State Governor and Visitor to the University, Arakunrin Oluwarotimi Akeredolu, SAN for making the dream come true.

"Simply put, Mr Governor, Sir, without your kind and pragmatic action of approving this facility, originally designed to host a model secondary school, and provision of some financial support to undertake some renovation, the dream of starting this School would still have remained a "paperwork". Indeed, the thought of ever starting a campus in Bolorunduro, in addition to our main campus in Ondo and our other large campus in Akure would hardly ever have occurred to

anyone – certainly not me! We are, indeed, deeply grateful, Sir, for making this dream a beautiful reality," he concluded.


Centre for Herbal Medicine and Drug Discovery

MOLECULAR LAB WILL TACKLE

COVID-19 AND OTHER DEADLY DISEASES

The Vice-Chancellor, University of Medical Sciences, Ondo City, Ondo State, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi, has stated that the newly established Molecular Biology Laboratory in the university will facilitate the diagnosis of COVID-19, Lassa fever and several other deadly infections.

The establishment of the Laboratory was supported by funds from the COVID-19 Response Fund Committee of the State Government and



Presidential Task Force on COVID-19. The Don, who spoke at the inauguration of the laboratory located on the premises of the

University of Medical Sciences Teaching Hospital, Ondo, said the laboratory was a key facility in the varsity's vision to utilise “molecular



biosciences to drive health research and training, as well as boost quality health care delivery.” “These facilities will also drive the use of molecular genomic techniques to better understand and address the challenges of diseases like cancer and diabetes as well as diagnose genetic disorders and provide DNA paternity testing,” Fatusi said. The new laboratory was inaugurated by the State Governor, Arakunrin Oluwarotimi Akeredolu. In his remarks, Akeredolu expressed his delight over the fight against



the spread of the deadly coronavirus disease in the State, stating that there was no COVID-19 patient in any of the State's isolation centers. He also disclosed that the committee set up by the government to raise funds for the COVID-19 campaign realised a sum of 800m for the fight against the spread of the pandemic in the state.

UNIMED Receives Full Accreditation for Nursing



The University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State has received full accreditation from the Nursing and Midwifery Council of Nigeria (NMCN) for the Bachelor of Nursing Science programme.


The full accreditation status is also accompanied by an increase in the annual intake from 50 to 75 students.

The approval was conveyed in a letter which was addressed to the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi, by the Secretary-General and Registrar of the Council, Faruk Umar Abubakar, on Thursday, June 10, 2021.

A yearly intake of Seventy-Five (75) students, as approved by the NMCN, represent a fifty percent (50%) increase in the total number of candidates that will be admitted for the programme in subsequent academic sessions.

This development follows the visit of members of the Council to the

University in February 2021 and it means that Nursing Students of the University who are presently in 500 level will graduate as and when due.

Oduntan donates books to UNIMED




An accomplished Community Health Physician, Prof. Subqat Oludayisi Oduntan has donated several books to the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State, Nigeria. Prof. Oduntan, who retired from the University of Ibadan about two decades ago is one of Nigeria's foremost public health experts and community health physicians and the first female President of the National Postgraduate Medical

College of Nigeria.

She had served on numerous Expert, Research and Advisory Committees nationally and internationally, including the World Health Organization, the International Federation of Hygiene and Preventive and Social Medicine and the Federal Ministry of Health among others.

The books she donated included priceless historical materials in the field of public health that will help build up the history of Public Health and Medicine unit of UNIMED School of Public Health. Other books donated covered various areas of public health and community medicine, and general medical

practise. In addition, she also donated books on anaesthesia from the invaluable collections of her husband, a retired Professor of Anaesthesia and Intensive Care.

Matriculates 639 Students



No fewer than 639 students took the matriculation oath at the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo as the institution held its 6th matriculation ceremony on Tuesday, April 13, 2021. Speaking at the event, the Vice-Chancellor of the institution, Prof Adesegun Fatusi said the set was



the largest since he assumed office as the second VC of the University. According to him, UNIMED is the first university in Nigeria to admit students into Bachelor of Science in Community Health Sciences, the second university nationally to start a Bachelor's Degree

programme in Prosthetics and Orthotics, and the second in South-West Nigeria to start B.Sc. programme in Radiology and Radiation Science. Fatusi described the institution as a model of success within the Nigerian University System and

one of the fastest growing universities in Nigeria, saying that the University has a higher conglomeration of health and medical science courses than any university in Nigeria today. The VC added that with the commencement of the Bachelor of



Prosthetics and Orthotics alongside the existing Bachelor of Physiotherapy, which is already in its fifth year, the institution already has the equivalent record of any Nigerian university in terms of the highest number of medical rehabilitation programmes established. Actively working in close collaboration with the National Universities Commission, UNIMED, according to the VC, hopes to be the first university in Nigeria to establish Bachelor's Degree programmes in three other medical rehabilitation fields: Occupational Therapy, Speech Therapy, and Audiology. In his words, "our dream of becoming the leading center for medical rehabilitation training in West Africa would become a reality by God's great grace. We are also working towards establishing additional new courses, including Pharmacy and Biomedical Engineering within the next 1-2 years. Fatusi noted that the matriculation has a special place in the annals of UNIMED because it is the first time students would be admitted into twelve new courses recently approved by the

National Universities Commission. The courses include Community Health Science, Environmental Health Science, Environmental Management and Toxicology, Food Science, Human Nutrition and Dietetics. Other newly approved courses include Prosthetics and Orthotics, Radiography and Radiation Science, Science Laboratory Technology, Statistics, Physics, Computer Science, and Information Science. The Vice-Chancellor also thanked the State Governor, Arakunrin Oluwarotimi Akeredolu for his continued support that has made the institution's dream a reality, emphasizing the Governor's deep passion for UNIMED, his exemplary encouragement and support towards the University's development, the huge confidence that he has reposed in the School and the solid backing for the Management's developmental agenda. Fatusi congratulated the matriculating students and advised them to be of good conduct at all times. Also speaking at the event, one of

the matriculants, Abiodun Arinmo expressed joy, and promised to work hard so as to come out with good grade in order to become a successful person in future. In addition, one of the parents, Mr. Ife Adedayo commended the efforts of the State Government, urging the government not to relent in supporting the institution, because the school still requires a lot of facilities.

Holds National Workshop on Space Technology and Health with CAR-NASRDA

The Vice-Chancellor of the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi, has said that the Institution will continue to explore every opportunity to develop not only as the first specialized University of medical and health sciences in Nigeria but to be recognized for excellence and innovation locally and internationally.

Fatusi stated this during a National Workshop on Space Technologies and Health jointly organized by the University and the Centre for Atmospheric Research of the National Space Research and Development Agency (CAR-NASRDA).

He maintained that UNIMED would be known for the quality of teaching and be at the forefront of cutting edge research and innovations.

“We would also be a good example for other universities to follow in the transformative application of scientific knowledge and scholarly outputs to the improvement of the health and development of our people and society.

“Among others, we have set the record of establishing Nigeria's first Faculty of Medical Rehabilitation and fast becoming the leading centre for Medical Rehabilitation Education in West Africa.

“Recently, our Governor commissioned what can justifiably

be described as the first full-fledged School of Public Health in Nigeria, a Centre for Molecular Biosciences and Medical Genomics that is designed to be a pacesetter in medical research and service delivery, and a Centre for Herbal Medicine to drive our agenda for drug discovery. “We are young but without any apology, we are proudly ambitious and in full pursuit of our vision to be “a thriving medical and health sciences University, locally and internationally recognized for excellence and innovation.

” For us in UNIMED, we hope that this workshop will serve as a springboard to a new research agenda and collaboration that will attract new research funds, including more National Research Fund from TETFund and new funds



from the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology and international development partners.

“We also hope that the workshop will also serve as a platform to jumpstart our telehealth project to extend higher



quality services to our community outreach centre in Ilutitun in Okitipupa Local Government Area and support our innovative community-based primary health care services in Oke-Igbo and also Bolorunduro area where we are starting a new initiative in Community-Oriented Primary Health Care,” Fatusi said.

Speaking at the event, the Director and Chief Executive, Centre for Atmospheric Research, Prof. Babatunde Rabiú said the objectives of the workshop include identifying areas where space technology can enhance health care and policy in Africa; and facilitating the development of the framework for a work plan on applications of space science and technology in health amongst others.

He said “A workshop of this nature is uncommon and ground-breaking. It is a window of opportunity to imbibe new best practice that has become a new order at the global level.”



Meanwhile, the State Governor, Arakunrin Oluwarotimi Akeredolu, said his administration is committed to bringing quality and affordable health care to the doorsteps of the citizens and achieving universal health coverage in the state.

Akeredolu who was represented by the Secretary to the State Government (SSG), Princess Oladunni Odu said his administration has prioritised health care and devoted

substantial resources to the School of Public Health and other components of the University of Medical Sciences as well as the associated teaching hospital.

According to him, these facilities are ultimately crucial to the goal of developing critical manpower for the the primary healthcare sector in the state.



GENDER BASED VIOLENCE (GBV)

80 Million Women EXPOSED TO GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE IN NIGERIA, says UNFPA

- GBV workers should be categorised as essential workers – UNIMED V.C

The United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) has disclosed that an estimated 80 million women in Nigeria are exposed to gender-based violence (GBV).

According to the Fund, gender-based violence not only strain the health system resources, but also limits women's growth and productivity, impedes the well-being of families and communities, and hinders governments from achieving national goals that lead to health and women's advancement.

It therefore called for an urgent need to bring to the fore, the crucial role of health services in responding to gender-based violence, and



the categorisation of gender-based violence workers as essential workers across the country to enable ease of access to services.

The Country Representative of the UNFPA, Ms Elisabeth Mueller, made these known during the Orange, the World session sponsored by the European Union/United Nations at the 37th Annual General Meeting and Scientific Conference

of the Association of Public Health Physicians of Nigeria (APHPN) in Abuja.

In his keynote address, the Vice-Chancellor of University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State, Prof Adesegun Fatusi, said: “We must as a matter of priority categorise GBV workers as essential workers and they must always have the access to be able to

provide services for the people.”

Prof. Fatusi stressed the need to entrench issues of gender-based violence and survivor clinical practices into the curriculum of medical and health sciences schools.

“Health workers are at the centre of providing services. We need to look at systematically increasing the capacity of healthcare workers on GBV cases and integrating into the curriculum of our medical schools, nursing schools, and all our health training schools, concerning

the whole issue about GBV and survivor clinical practices,” he stated.

“Many of the women who have experienced violence in Nigeria never have access to such services. We must think about sustainable financing and ensuring budget releases, implementation and put in place accountability mechanisms,” the VC concluded.

Tell us about your school days, how was the Journey?

How hard I worked through my four years in school! Going down memory lane, I remember where I lodged, there was no power supply throughout those years, I had to transport all my gadgets to school to charge for use at home. Also, having heard from my seniors that biochemistry isn't a child's play, I was a bit scared of the big task ahead of me. I achieved this through persistence and discipline, reading for 8 hours each day, I made it my watchword that before going to play with my friends I must not go with my brain empty. Also through prayers, as a Christian that loves going to church, I believe that God is the

only one that can make you achieve great success. Perseverance is also essential because you can't understand all through books alone. I met my seniors and lecturers for enlightenment about some courses that I'm not conversant with, as well as colleagues from other universities that can put me through.

How about your foundation?


My foundation was not very strong, but due to my parents' persistence, I was able to cope, all thanks to them. I was poor academically in primary school. I remember my mum would always tell me that if I fail, I would remain at home for a long time. So I had to buckle up at my alma mater, St Louis Girls Grammar School, Akure where I had my secondary school education.

Tell us about your days in the National Youth Service Corps?

I served at the Center of Excellence on Reproductive Health and Innovation, University of Benin, Benin City and at Women Health and Action Research Centre. I was opportune to work with international Master and Ph.D students from Ghana, the Gambia and South Africa. I was able to work with renowned professors like Prof. Omonkhua and Prof. Okonofua. We were able to work on three TETFund projects, it was an interesting experience for me.

Since your employment in UNIMED as a lecturer, has there been any challenge?

Due to my physical stature and young age, sometimes, I am not respected as a lecturer. It is not about dressing well because even when well dressed, students look down on me and it is really painful. My first class with the students was hilarious, the students were not paying attention to what I was saying, they were wondering how I could be a lecturer at this age. I have to beg them to listen to my lectures and not otherwise. Subsequent lectures improved as testimonies abound that they were enjoying the lectures. Some are even saying that they never knew that Biochemistry was that simple. I make sure I explain every detail to them, they love the techniques I use in teaching them, some of them approached me to be their mentor.



What is your opinion about the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo?

I got to know about the University of Medical Sciences, Ondo through an advert, even though I was trying to process my admission to the University of Ibadan then, but my dad asked me to apply to UNIMED which is in my hometown and I was accepted. I keep telling people that if I had gone to other universities, I don't know if the potentials in me would have been exhibited because what I enjoyed in UNIMED cannot be compared to what other schools would offer me. The school is well equipped and conducive to learning. My dream was not to study Biochemistry, I applied for Medicine but was given Biochemistry. I then wrote another JAMB in my 100 level but after the first-semester result was released and I discovered that I was leading in the class, I decided to go on with the course.

What are your plans for the future?

My plan is to become UNIMED's youngest Professor and help discover drugs that can reduce the burden of diseases in the society. I also wish to mentor others to attain excellence. I benefited from such mentorship and will like to motivate someone.

What is your advice for students of the University?

My advice for the students is to change their orientation about attaining excellence. It is not impossible to be the best in whatever field you choose because records are set to be broken. I came to UNIMED with the mentality that no one in my family had a first-class, I was determined to break this record. I came to the school with the mentality that Biochemistry is difficult and that I as a female, will break the record and become a first-class student. With determination and vision, you can achieve great things. Also, when things are difficult you don't give up, you walk up to people who can guide you and put you through. Be humble, my junior brother taught me chemistry when I was in 300 level and I got an A. People you think are not better than you have vital things that can transform you.

Will you like to share some words of appreciation?

Today, I'm sharing this success story because of some people's contributions and I will mention a few if you permit me. My appreciation goes to the Almighty God and my lovely parents. Also to Professor Friday Okonofua, who gave me a shoulder I could lean on, I'm appreciating him for letting me come back to my Alma mater to serve, thereby motivating others, showing that all this can be achieved. I also appreciate the new Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi for his fatherly care and love. I appreciate my HOD for his care, for supervising my project research, even when I was in NYSC he checked up on me. To all the Lecturers in Biochemistry, you all are wonderful, I can't thank you less. To Mr Dare Bada, thank you for being my guardian. To my spiritual mentor, Pastor and Mrs Sule-Boyede Moses, my success story won't have been complete if you weren't there. God bless you all.

To Building A Future Generation of Ethically Responsive Researchers

The Vice-Chancellor, University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi has said the Management of the Institution is committed to building a future generation of ethically responsive researchers.

He stated this during a 3-day Workshop facilitated by the National Health Research Ethics Committee (NHREC), Federal Ministry of Health, Abuja for members of the UNIMED Research Ethics Committee, a programme that started on Tuesday 22nd June, 2021.

Prof. Fatusi affirmed that the University is well-positioned to prepare graduates and researchers that can tackle what he termed the challenges of the new century.

“We are six years old, but today, in this country, we have the largest number of health and medical courses. So, we believe that we have a historical responsibility to re-create things including the type of research needed. We want to build the capacity of our staff in research and in terms of teaching to ensure that our products are of high quality. We are therefore preparing graduates that are prepared to face the challenges of the new century and without ethics, everything is zero,” the VC said.

“Like I always argue, when you have integrity, there is nothing else to worry about but if you don't have integrity, there is nothing else too. For us, building integrity in research, teaching and

everyday behaviour becomes something we are passionate about and we are very glad that NHREC facilitators are here to help us this week,” he added.

Prof. Fatusi said: “for us as a University, one of the things we have said to ourselves is that there is no need to have another University if we just follow the same pattern and do not do certain things differently. The opportunity of a young University is to re-write things the way you want. One of the things we are enthusiastic about is that we want to raise a crop of academicians, who are not just going to be writing papers



because they need promotion but people who are going to be genuinely interested in research to make considerable changes in the lives of people. Without us having a very strong Ethics Committee, we cannot truly promote very strong quality research work. Once you compromise ethics, quality is compromised and the result is compromised and you put the people you are working with in danger.”

He appreciated the Chairman of UNIMED Research Ethics Committee, Prof. Olugbemiga Adeodu and other members of the Committee, expressing his confidence in them.

“We have absolute confidence in your ability not only to function as members of this committee but also to become people who can then relate this message and build the capacity of others and support them,” the VC stated.

He also appreciated the NHREC facilitators – Prof. Morenike Ukpong Folayan, Prof. Ademola Ajuwon and Mr. Ado Danladi for their commitments.

One of the Facilitators, Prof. Morenike Folayan, noted that the training is a requirement for the Ethics Committee itself not just to build the capacity of its members but to also be registered and licensed to operate by the National Health Research Ethics Committee that coordinates ethics committees in the country.

“I applaud the Management of UNIMED for taking this step; it comes with a cost and many Institutions are unwilling to pay that cost and therefore, they have untrained Committee members and of course, it has its impact. I can only imagine that the training of this Ethics Committee will translate positively because what happens is that they give positive support to the researchers of the institution to do what is right,” she stated.



Health Research Ethics Committee: **FOLAYAN APPLAUDS UNIMED Management**

■ **Why The Research Ethics Workshop at UNIMED Is Very Important.**



The National Health Research Ethics Committee, Abuja, Nigeria recently concluded a 3-day workshop on “Protection of Human Participants and Responsible Conduct of Research” for the Health Research Ethics Committee of the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State.*

In this exclusive interview conducted by the University's

Prof. Folayan, Board Chairman, Heartland Alliance International Nigeria, works as a researcher with the Obafemi Awolowo University (OAU), Ile-Ife, Nigeria. She also serves as the Deputy Director of the OAU College of Health Sciences' Partnership and Research Advancement Unit and coordinates the Research and Innovation Support Unit of OAU. She is also the Coordinator of the New HIV Vaccine and Microbicide Advocacy Society (NHVMAS).

Can you tell us more about your educational and professional background?

I went to the Federal Government Girls' College Akure for my secondary school education and then proceeded to the University of Ife (now Obafemi Awolowo University), where I was trained as a Dentist. I, thereafter, went to Obafemi Awolowo University Teaching Hospital for my specialization training in Paediatric Dentistry. I have a Master's degree in Business Administration at O.A.U and another Master's in Education which I earned at the University of Nicosia, Cyprus, Greece; and I am currently doing my Ph.D.

I am a child Dentist and I spend more of my time doing research in pediatric dentistry, what we call early childhood caries. Beyond that, I have done a lot of work around HIV and currently, I'm working on Oral, Mental and Sexual Reproductive Health of Adolescents and Young persons.

What is the significance of this ongoing Research Ethics Workshop?

I am here as part of the team conducting training for the Ethics Committee members of the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED) in Ondo, the first dedicated university to medical science training. One would expect that in the University of Medical Sciences, there is going to be a lot of research going on and ethics is a critical element to research. It is not just for science validity but also ethical integrity and that research must be devoid of exploitation and abuse of study participants. So, the Ethics Committee was constituted by the University but the Committee members need to be trained to be able to have the capacity to do the work that was delegated to them by the University. We are here to conduct a three-day training which is a requirement for the Ethics Committee itself, not just to build the capacity of its members but also to be registered and licensed to operate by the National Health Research Ethics Committee that coordinates Ethics committees in the country.

How will this training translate to a positive outcome for the University?

First of all, I will applaud the Management of this University for taking this step, because it comes with a cost and many institutions are unwilling to part with that cost and therefore, they have untrained Committee members that perform this role. I can only imagine that the training of UNIMED Ethics Committee would translate positively because what can happen is that they give positive support to the researchers of the institution to do what is right.

First, the number of quality research that comes out of

the University increases and that will create visibility for the University itself. Second, because of the quality research coming out of the University, it impacts the growth and economic development of whichever environment that they reside or operates. The Ethics Committee becomes a guide for the researchers to do what is ethical and what is ethical is for your research to bring about the development of not only the country but the local government that hosts you.

Is there anything in this for the host community?

One of the highlights at this workshop is that once you are ethical, you don't abuse the communities that host you, instead, they should benefit. You find out that around the world, communities that host Universities are always better off in terms of education and health indices; they become the first respondent beneficiaries of research outcomes. I would only want to believe that UNIMED is going to take that stand and not operate like older institutions that exploit their community, rather, the focus of UNIMED would be to benefit its immediate environment.



Can the students benefit from this training?

The students also benefit in the same way as the staff would benefit because the students' project will be reviewed by the Ethics Committee and they, therefore, at a very young age, start to understand the Ethics of Engagement when it comes to research; that becomes a lifetime pattern. It is something that operates everywhere in the world and they don't become an exception to that. So, I see you starting to build a future generation of ethically responsive researchers by engaging the students through this process.

What is your take on the idea of having a specialized medical university?

I think there are always pros and cons, but within the context of Nigeria, having a specialized university allows for concentrated and focused training to improve health. I think it is a major plus. We have a significant number of universities around the country and sadly, one of my banes about these universities is that you don't have specialization and that is not how you operate around the world.

When you think of Harvard, you think of business. When you think of Massachusetts, you think of engineering. In the past, when you think of the University of Lagos, you think of engineering, when you think of OAU in the past, you think of law but now, we don't have this kind of strength.

So when you think of a University of Medical Sciences like this, I have a lot of expectations especially in a country where the indices around health are consistently poor. I think there is a place for that concentrated need to address that health problem that we have. In other places, they might have other problems not related to health and so they might be looking for other specialized institutions but for Nigeria, at this time, there is a need to address health.



Our general Universities cannot do that because they are not specialized or empowering themselves to do anything that is focused beyond teaching students. When you have a specialized medical university, you are keying into the gap that is happening in the country and you are grooming people. That will in a way address that. Maybe in another 50 years, we might shift away from health and be looking at technology but at this time in the history of this country, specialized grooming of those that can make a difference in the health sector is very appropriate.

Would you agree that the female gender is vulnerable?

I think it depends on the context. When you define the context of vulnerability as not being empowered, I won't go that route. Yes, there is vulnerability because of cultures and norms in the society. The vulnerability also increases because women are socialized not to be empowered, as a significant number of women see their place to be quiet, see their place not to fight, see their place to be second fiddle.

After all, they are socialized to think like that, not because that is who they are. That increases their vulnerability and reduces their ability to fight for the spaces they

otherwise could occupy. I think I have been privileged, not because I haven't received hit backs but because I have been groomed in a way that hit back is just one of those things; I see them as life and not a barrier. I must say also that now that I'm up here, I see a lot more gender inequality than when I was down. In an academic environment, there must be consciousness for the University to create that supportive environment.

necessary support, saying all hands must be on deck to achieve good health for all. Dr Osunmakinwa also noted that



Needless to say that Fatusi's intimidating credentials, demonstrable leadership skills and stellar performance as Provost made him the candidate to beat of all the eggheads who vied for UNIMED's top job. According to Prof. Okonofua, "we went through a thorough process to select the Vice-Chancellor who succeeded me. I have known him for years, we attended the same medical school. Prof. Adesegun Fatusi is extremely proactive. I am very proud of him. As I wake up everyday, I have no doubts that University of Medical Sciences is in very good hands and I pray that when he finishes, the university will also be handed over to another good administrator."

for medical rehabilitation in West Africa by 2022.

In just one year, Prof. Fatusi's uncommon leadership style and administrative skills have exposed the university to the international community and positioned it for funding locally, such as the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund).
