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he University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State has graduated 252 students at its 2nd and 3rd combined convocation held on Wednesday 2nd February 2022.

The event which was held at the University's Main Auditorium,
Odosida Campus, Ondo had in attendance the Ondo State Governor,
Arakunrin Oluwarotimi Akeredolu, Members House of Representatives, royal fathers, Vice-Chancellors and other dignitaries.

The Vice-Chancellor of the university, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi revealed that the combined convocation ceremony is for the 76 graduands from the 2019/2020 set and 176 from the 2020/2021 set, making a total of 252 graduands which cut across four faculties in the Institution. He noted that there are 6 first-class students, 106-second class honours (upper division), 106 first-class honours (lower division) and 11 third class students among the graduands.

'This convocation ceremony shall witness the graduation of the first set of students from our nursing science and physiotherapy programmes who have already been professionally inducted by the respective registration

council last year and are therefore licensed to practice, 'the VC said.

'In line with our commitment to promoting excellence and as we have done across other fields since my assumption of office, the best student in the first set of each programme has an offer of automatic appointment from this university. All of our first-class graduates also have the same offer, Fatusi added.

On the strides and progress of the university, the VC said the National University Commission has ranked UNIMED the 3rd best-specialized institution, saying the university is only coming behind the 40-year-old Federal University of Technology Akure (FUTA) and 31-year-old Ladoke



Akintola University of Technology (LAUTECH). UNIMED also stands out as the 2nd best ranked University in Ondo State, combining federal state and private universities, coming after FUTA and 4th best State University in the country. Thus, we are not just the first historically as a specialized university of medical sciences, we are simply the best of them all,' the VC affirmed.

In his lecture titled, "Shaping the Future Of National Development in the Post-Covid 19 Era: The University as Catalyst," the Convocation Lecturer, Prof. Oyewale Tomori - a past president of the Nigerian Academy of Science and pioneer Vice-Chancellor Redeemers University, appreciated the state government for giving unflinching support to UNIMED.

'Acclamation and appreciation must also be accorded for the continued support by the current Governor of Ondo State for his support to UNIMED. You may wonder why there should be any special acknowledgment of a government performing the function it was elected to do. We see the country littered with the debris of poor governance, and when we see an oasis of quality performance in the desert of decadence, we need to loudly acknowledge the performance,' Tomori said.

He advised graduands to support Nigeria to make progress, stating that the country had been facing regression and there is a need for Nigerian youth to wake the country from its slumber, saying it will not be worthwhile to acquire a degree that does not have an impact on society.

ndo State Governor and Visitor, University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo, Arakunrin Oluwarotimi Akeredolu, SAN has stressed the need to address the mass exodus of health personnel in the country. He spoke at the 2nd and 3rd combined Convocation ceremony of UNIMED held on 2nd February 2022, at the main auditorium, Odosida Campus of the University.

He noted that universities are globally acknowledged as institutions for nurturing ideas, driving innovations, and catalysing development, hence the introduction of specialized medical universities. 'History will forever bear witness to the fact that the Sunshine State blazed the trail of establishing Nigeria's first specialised medical and health sciences university, UNIMED, which was established on 8th December 2014. As an administration, we are committed, more than ever, to the funding, resourcing and overall development of this university within the limit of our resources. We are also committed to helping the university mobilise resources from other areas for its continued growth and development' Governor Akeredolu affirmed.

He added: 'Undoubtedly, UNIMED has been blessed, from its inception till date, with highly committed, purposeful and visionary leadership. TELL US HOW IT FEELS, TWO AND HALF YEARS AS THE VICE-CHANCELLOR OF NIGERIA'S FIRST SPECIALISED MEDICAL UNIVERSITY.

It has been an experience and exciting job because the whole concept of a university of medical sciences is something virtually unknown in the Nigerian university arena until UNIMED came on board. It is like charting through uncharted water but the dynamic sofit make it exciting; it is an opportunity to bring forth a new dimension. So, the journey in the last two and half years had allowed us to do what has never been done before in the Nigerian university system. Let me give you two examples very quickly. We established a faculty of medical rehabilitation about two years ago. No university in this country has ever had such faculty and the number of courses we are bringing on board does not exist anywhere within the Nigerian university system. Next, talk about school of public health, we have the first full-fledged school of public health here at the University of Medical Sciences, Ondo. So it has been a journey of two years... there are challenges, there are ups, there are downs, but it is very exciting.

PEOPLE OFTEN ASSUME THAT CAREER OPPORTUNITIES IN SPECIALIZED MEDICAL UNIVERSITIES LIKE THESE ARE ALWAYS LIMITED, FOR EXAMPLE MEDICINE, NURSING, AND DENTISTRY BUT ON YOUR ASSUMPTION OF OFFICE, THE PROGRAMMES INCREASED TO ABOUT 26. CAN YOU HIGHLIGHT THESE NEW CAREER OPPORTUNITIES?

That's true, every time people ask me, do you have up to five courses? But the truth is that we have the largest collection of health professional courses, out of any university in Nigeria today. In addition, we are not just about the health profession, we have a science-driven



professional approach to health sciences which is the norm in the 21st century. We have the core ones, which include medicine, nursing, dentistry, physiotherapy, and medical laboratory science, but we have alot of courses in the sciences. Let me highlight why this is important. What drives the world of medicine is not the profession, it is the science behind it. For example, when COVID-19 came, doctors were treating patients but we needed a vaccine to overcome the pandemic. The vaccine does not come from Doctors or Nurses, it comes from those in biomedical sciences. That is why we must

a Medical Physicist and if you don't study Physics, you can't be a Medical Physicist. We offer Mathematics and Statistics because when we do drug trials, we need to know which drug

Medicinal Chemists. The equipment used in medicine that helps in diagnosis is produced by



works and we need the science of statistics. We also offer Mathematics because when you think about the epidemiology of diseases, you have to do modelling which is in

the field of mathematics. So, every science that

has to do with the field of medicine and health are all available at UNIMED. Our vision is to be a one-stop institution in any field of the health profession and all related sciences.

UNIMED HAS A FULL-FLEDGED SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH, WHAT IS THE IMPORTANCE OF THIS FIELD OF STUDY?

Public Health is what changes lives, not curative, and by that, I don't mean to drag the curative down. A lot of women die in Nigeria due to childbirth issues... somebody who has had seven children is pregnant and now has a ruptureduterus. The surgeon will try to suture, while a public health person will try to prevent the person from having the rupture in the first place by educating her and giving her family planning. That is why public health is important. If you go around the world, the school of public health is the norm because it has several sub-specialties. When you don't run Public Health as a school, you can not realize its full-fledge potential. In our School of Public Health, we have five departments, they are Epidemiology and Biostatistics; Health Education and Health Promotion; Health Policy and Management; Population, Family and Reproductive Health. Those are distinct areas of Public Health and when you have a school, it gives you the opportunity to blossom and that is why we have been able to move very fast, not just running undergraduate but also postgraduate programmes. For example, we run

undergraduate programme in Community Health Science. We are the first school in this country that has BSc. in Community Health Science. Apart from the Bachelor's, we have Master's of Science programmes (MSc) in Public Health, Master's of Public Health (MPH),

Doctor of Public Health, and Doctor of Philosophy in Public

Health (DPhil). We are able to achieve these because we have a full-fledged school of public health which is fully staffed. We also operate a school of public health without a wall, in other words, we don't

distinguish academia for practice. We have a school of public health that fuses theory with practice, bringing practitioners from the field to teach. Therefore, we have a unique opportunity to showcase what public health is, how it should run, and I am sure that in the coming years, other universities will come to learn from us because we are in the forefront of

learn from us because we doing that in this country.

IN THE NEXT COUPLE OF MONTHS, CANDIDATES WILL BE APPLYING TO VARIOUS UNIVERSITIES AROUND THE COUNTRY. WHY SHOULD A CANDIDATE COME AND BUILD HIS OR HER CAREER IN UNIMED?

We have what we call the 'UNIMED advantage'. Number one advantage is that they are coming to a school that is totally dedicated to excellence. Our slogan in UNIMED is 'excellence or nothing.'Others may compromise, but we don't compromise. We are the first specialized medical university in Nigeria, therefore we must set the pace and excellence is the watchword.

Number two, according to the 2021 NUC university ranking,

UNIMED is Nigeria's best specialized health and medical sciences university. Number three, if you want to go to a school, why go to a school that offers all kinds of programmes when you

can choose a specialized institution with focused attention?

We are building all our strength around these advantages. Being specialized gives you an advantage, you'd get the focus and the support you need to be the best you can. Number four, UNIMED is one school where there is nothing like strike or industrial action. Almost all government-owned schools are on strike but UNIMED is 7 years and there is no issue of strike, running seamlessly. Another advantage is that the amount of school fee you pay can't be compared to the quality of education you get. In other words, UNIMED is cost-effective in terms of what you take from the institution compared to what you pay.

AS YOU MENTIONED EARLIER, "EXCELLENCE OR NOTHING", THAT APPROACH IS NOT CHEAP BECAUSE THE ECONOMY IS BAD. SOME PEOPLE MAY WONDER WHY DON'T WE BRING IT DOWN A LITTLE. FOR INSTANCE, YOU ARE PREPARING A POT OF SOUP AND YOU CAN'T AFFORD FISH OR MEAT BUT YOU CAN AFFORD PONMO (COW SKIN), WHY NOT TRY THIS APPROACH WITH THE UNIVERSITY INSTEAD OF THIS STANDARD OF EXCELLENCE OR NOTHING?

Thank you very much Tope. I hear this comment a lot and when I hear them, I think that it shows some level of inadequate understanding around a couple of issues. For example, let's say you train a person in physical health or physical education, if he does not know enough or he makes mistakes, he probably won't make the top team or his team won't make it to the

top. If you train somebody in Philosophy and he is not very good, he may goof and that will be all. If you train a doctor where your focus is not excellence or nothing, every mistake can cost life. That is somebody's father, mother, brother, sister, son or daughter. If I tell you that this doctor is good but is not as good, how many people will go to him or her? That is why for us, there is no two way about it because we are dealing with lives and lives matter. In UNIMED there is no room, absolutely none for compromise, cutting short, or negotiating lower values.

When you think about that philosophy, you will understand why it got to be the way it is. When you talk about the economy, think about it this way. I tell people, when you compare conventional universities with a specialized medical university, you are comparing apples with oranges, because there are vast differences economically. A conventional school may have twenty-five thousand students out of which one hundred are in medical school and twenty-five dental students. Such institution can use the money made from the 24, 875 students to run the medical school but in a specialized university, every programme has a quota. For instance, the Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria will approve 50 for medicine students, 10 for dentistry, how will you breakeven? Not too long ago, we invested over three hundred million naira to buy equipment for Dentistry whereas we have approval to admit just 10 students in Dentistry. Think about the student-teacher ratio, NUC has established a ratio where the number of students per lecturer is determined. The highest ratio where you have lesser number of students to a teacher is in medical sciences. So, you need more teachers for the same number of students. If you run a conventional university programme, NUC will come for accreditation and that is the end, but if you run a medical-related

programme, you will pay NUC to do accreditation, you will also pay each of the professional bodies and each costs millions. You must be accredited by Medical and Dental Council, Nursing Council, Science Laboratory Council, Medical Laboratory Science Council, Rehabilitation Council. When you add all these up, clearly we are not talking about the same cost with conventional universities.



THERE IS A LOT OF RUMOUR ABOUT UNIMED SCHOOL FEES. MANY ARE SAYING UNIMED STUDENTS PAY MILLIONS DESPITE SEVERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS. CAN YOU PLEASE CLEAR THE AIR ON THE EXACT SCHOOL FEES?

Nigerians thrive on rumour. Even those who are educated won't go online and check the rates. In UNIMED you can pay as less as one hundred and eighty thousand naira depending on your course of study and more than half of our programmes will cost you less than two hundred and fifty thousand naira. indecent dressing, plagiarism, cultism, violence, cybercrimes, and the use of illicit drugs. You all need to comport yourself as responsible and good ambassadors of the University,' Fatusi stated.

He informed the students that the institution has constituted an anti-corruption committee to investigate any form of corrupt practices within the University and a student

disciplinary committee charged with handling issues of student misconduct and malpractices. He said students should ensure that they don't flout the school rules as any student who does that will face disciplinary action.

> On the issue of school fees, Prof. Fatusi said the University management understands the current economic realities facing members of the public and assured the matriculants that there will be no further increase in school fees.

'I pray that the Lord will provide for your parents. We know the situation of the country and we are not interested in increasing school fees indiscriminately. We were forced to increase fees last year not because we don't know the situation of things but because we have a commitment that this school

must produce the best. For a specialized university, it takes a lot of funds, but I can assure you that for the next couple of years, please be at rest, there will be no increase in school fees,' the VC stated.

Prof. Fatusi indicated that the University has 8 faculties with 26 courses, all duly accredited and approved by the relevant national regulatory bodies.

'We are looking forward to moving onto the final stage of the medical programme accreditation which will enable us to graduate our first set of medical physicians this year,' he stated.

The Vice-Chancellor assured the students that they have made the right decision in choosing the University of Medical Sciences, stating



that the young university, according to the National Universities Commission (NUC), is the 3rd best ranked specialized university, only coming behind the 40-year-old Federal University of Technology, Akure (FUTA) and 31-year-old Ladoke Akintola University of Technology (LAUTECH).

Thereafter, the Registrar, UNIMED, Ondo Dr. Woleola Ekundayo led the students to take the matriculation oath, while some of them were invited to sign the matriculation register during the event. The matriculation ceremony was well attended by parents, Joint Admission Matriculation Board representatives, Principal Officers, Deans and Heads of Departments of the University.





Postgraduate Education:

Catalyst for Human Development

UNIMED VC

he Vice-Chancellor, University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi has described postgraduate education as a driving force for expanding the frontiers of knowledge and advancing human development. He stated this at the first Postgraduate Discourse of the university tagged 'Postgraduate Education as a catalyst for research, innovation and acquisition for teaching and learning skills held on Wednesday, 25th May 2022.

Prof. Fatusi noted that UNIMED has invested significantly towards ensuring a sound implementation framework for postgraduate education, because of the need to expand the University's horizon in the production of highly skilled health scientists and professionals with the ability to significantly contribute to national and global development through sound, credible and ethical research, and scientific endeavours.

"I am confident that our postgraduate programmes will be operated in line with our

overarching philosophy of 'excellence or nothing.' No doubt, our postgraduate programmes will bear the classic mark of the 'UNIMED advantage': providing high-quality education that responds positively to global dynamics of the 21st Century educational and development landscape, and operates in a steady environment of uninterrupted academic sessions, thereby ensuring timely graduation of high-impact graduates," the VC said.

According to the Vice-Chancellor, 'the University, despite being the third- highest ranked specialized university in Nigeria and the best ranked of the growing number of specialized medical and health sciences universities by the National Universities Commission in 2021, we are not at our destination and we will not rest on our oars till we achieve the great vision of our founding fathers, which is to be a thriving Medical and Health Sciences University, locally, nationally, and internationally recognized for excellence and innovation.'

The VC thereafter revealed that UNIMED will henceforth give priority to Postgraduate students of the University in terms of employment opportunities so as to support them in achieving their dreams. Similarly, the Dean, Postgraduate School, UNIMED, Ondo, Prof. Julius Ademokoya pointed out the essence of the discourse, stating that it will serve as a forum for understanding the need for setting up and counting the cost of a postgraduate school.









'The purpose of setting up Postgraduate Schools appears to have been reduced to a mere practice instead of necessity. Creating a platform such as this in our University is necessary for engaging experts in initiating, reviewing and propelling critical views on the roles of our Postgraduate School,' he affirmed.

The Director, Central Office for Research and Development, Prof. Olumide Ogundahunsi, while delivering his lecture titled 'The Place of Postgraduate Education in Research, Innovation, Teaching and Learning Skills' noted that the role of the University in

overseeing access to Master and Doctoral programmes, as well as maintaining the quality standard is vital, and that it is often done through the postgraduate school.

He said the postgraduate school can provide career development opportunities for mobility, international collaboration and inter-institutional cooperation.

Prof. Ogundahunsi held that higher education institutions flourish if they are well structured with clear policies and the capacity to adapt to contextual and contemporary needs.























he Vice-Chancellor, University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi has informed that Nigeria is yet to harness the potential of herbal medicine.

He made the remarks at a one-day symposium tagged 'Herbal Medicine: The past, the present and the future,' organized by the Center for Herbal Medicine and Drug Development of the University on Tuesday 10th May 2022 at the Laje Road Campus.

Prof. Fatusi noted that Nigeria would have to be deliberate in the effort to promote herbal medicine, noting that the power of science and the potential of herbs can make a difference in the country's health sector. He said, 'We have not harnessed our God-given heritage in the areas of herbs and what our forefathers have done, but UNIMED is beginning to turn around the story and this moment is that golden moment, this workshop opens up that opportunity for us to crystalize our vision and bring the Nigerian nation to understand the power of science merged with the power of herbs, making the whole difference not only to health but also the economy.'

Prof. Fatusi hinted that the dream of the University to start a Bachelor's degree programme in herbal medicine was halted by the lack of the

National Universities Commission (NUC) Benchmark Minimum Academic Standard (BMAS), now known as Core Curriculum and Minimum Academic Standard (CCMAS), for the programme.

'We have always had a great dream about herbal medicine in UNIMED starting from our foundation. UNIMED had proposed even starting a B. Sc. Programme in herbal medicine but the fact that there was no BMAS minimal standard for it with NUC stalled the whole process. That tells you how passionate we are about the programme,' Fatusi stated. He explained further that the University is working with NUC and other stakeholders to get an approved CCMAS to kick-start the programme.

There are great days ahead for our Centre for Herbal and Drug Discovery, and with our Faculty of Pharmacy coming on board soon, they will be complementing one another. So, we are driving the agenda for herbal medicine as no other person has ever done in this country, that is one of the advantages of being a specialized medical university,' Prof. Fatusi concluded.

The Keynote Speaker at the event, Director of the Center for Research and Development, Federal University of Technology, Akure (FUTA), Prof. Ganiyu Oboh, said the practice of herbal medicine has been the oldest form of health care and human beings have been surviving on nature to feed, treat and to prevent illness. The future of herbal medicine is inevitable integration into modern medical practice and it can only be achieved when there is a proper collaboration between government and all the actors involved in healthcare delivery, he said.

Prof. Oboh noted that strict monitoring and implementation of regulatory guidelines to curb undue proliferation of natural products, use, and sales of herbal remedies must be put in place.

The Dean School of Public Health LINIMED.

The Dean, School of Public Health, UNIMED, Ondo, Prof. Wasiu Adebimpe, while delivering a paper titled 'Public Health Concerns and Agenda for Integrating Herbal Medicine into the National Health System,' harped on the need for the integration of herbal and modern medicine.

'The use of traditional medical knowledge for drug development without the consent of customary knowledge holders is not acceptable under international law, hence, the need for the regulation of practice and practitioners; one must be able to distinguish between qualified practitioners and practices.

The Director, Office of Strategy and Programme Management, UNIMED, Ondo, Prof. Adeduro Adegeye, while presenting the last paper of the day, spoke on the 'economics of herbal medicine'. He noted that countries like China and India thrive economically because of herbal medicine and Nigeria has been endowed with lots of herbs that can improve the country's economic output.

Earlier, the Acting Director, Centre for Herbal Medicine and Drug Development, UNIMED, Ondo, Dr. Babawale Olatunji, in his welcome address, stated that the vision of the Centre is to be a study center that serves as a reference center and a standard place for studying traditional medicine in Nigeria and globally. This, he said, will stand as an effective bridge between orthodox and herbal medicine in delivering health services to the majority of the population

'Our goal is to provide rudimentary knowledge through training in herbal medicine to a broad set of people who will be in a position to provide health care services in collaboration with orthodox medicine providers or on their own,' Dr. Olatunji said.

Dignitaries at the event included the DVC, Administration and Clinical Services, UNIMED, Ondo, Prof. Adolphus Loto; DVC, Academic, UNIMED, Ondo, Prof. Roseangela Nwuba; the Registrar, represented by Deputy Registrar, Mrs. Bola Arowosegbe and the Ag. University Librarian, Mr. Femi Folorunso.

Others who joined virtually included the Bursar, UNIMED, Ondo, Mr. M.S.O. Shittu; Former member of UNIMED Governing Council, Prof. Tolu Odugbemi; Prof. Anthony Elujoba; Prof. Olukemi A. Odukoya; Prof. Yemisi Kunle; a professor of pharmacognosy, Prof. Jones Moody, among others.



UNIMED COCO 100% PASS in Part III BDS EXAMINATION





Il 500 level students of Dentistry at the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State have passed their BDS (Bachelor of Dental Surgery) part III examination, which was based on pediatrics, Internal medicine and surgery.

The examination, which started March 8, 2022 and ended March 16, 2022, followed a series of classes and clinical postings.

The Acting Head of Pediatrics and Child Health Department, UNIMED, Dr. Olasehinde Bello disclosed that the Department of pediatrics conducted a standardized BDS III professional examination for 14 UNIMED dental students.

'We don't take clinical exams with levity. We want to see you have hands-on on our patients rather than just a theory doctor. The external examiner was here because it was a standardized exam. It is not the same set of lecturers that were teaching them that also conducted the exam. The exam was regulated by the representatives of the Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria (MDCN),' Dr. Bello stated.

The HOD mentioned that the dental students do a rotation through pediatrics and child health to acquire more knowledge and widen the scope of their course of study.

'They are indeed dental students but they will always come across children in the course of practice, not only adults. They are rotating through us such that they can give at least first-aid treatment to any child that gets to them before they refer eventually to a pediatrician. And at the same time, when a child comes to them for dental issues, they should have an idea of how to treat children,' he added.



He said, 'today is a watershed in our agenda as a university in terms of what we see our university becoming and what we see as a crystalizing event that will ultimately define who we are as a University. One of the things that define a university as against a secondary school is research. A secondary or primary school will teach, but in the university, we don't teach abstractly, we use our research to inform what we teach and that is why without being a good researcher, I don't think you can progress considerably in our teaching agenda.'

The VC appreciated the Director, Central Office for Research and Development, UNIMED, Ondo, Prof. Olumide Ogundahunsi and all members of the Academic Events Planning Committee of the university for organizing the programme.

Delivering the Keynote lecture titled 'Achieving Academic Independence and Progression through Collaborative Research', the Guest Speaker, Dr. Akindele Olupelumi Adebiyi, president-elect of the International Epidemiological Association, a Public Health Physician and faculty at the College of Medicine, University of Ibadan, charged participants on the need to collaborate to achieve excellence.

'Research that does not solve a problem in society is a waste of time because the mandate of academia is teaching and inspiring change in society. This can only be achieved through quality research,'Adebiyi stated. He advised that young lecturers should be allowed protected time to enable them to carry out research. To promote accountability, the institution should design means of measuring productivity.


At the event, the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Academic, Prof. Roseangela Nwuba chaired an interactive panel discussion on career progression and independence. The programme also featured systematic analyses of faculty research and publication output, as well as poster presentations of research projects by faculties and researchers

A total of 32 researchers presented their research during the poster session. A panel of three senior professors was constituted by the organisers to determine the three best posters presented. Each poster was evaluated in the following 5 domains – i) Justification for the research, ii) presentation of the research work, iii) quality of the illustrations, iv) data analysis and v) interpretation of the results.

Following the panel's assessement, the first place was shared by Dr. A.O Falade from the Department of Biochemistry (Poster title: Computational studies on the cholinesterase, beta-secretase 1 and monoamine oxidase inhibitory activities of endophytes- derived compounds: towards the discovery of novel neurotherapeutics) and Dr. Ifeoluwa Oyeyemi from the Department of Biological Sciences (Poster title: Methanol extract of Nymphae lotus (Linn) ameliorated carbon tetrachloride-induced rat liver fibrosis and inhibit human castrate resistant prostate carcinoma in vitro). The two researchers were awarded a prize of \$\frac{1}{2}200,000\$ each to be used towards the advancement of their research work.

The poster presented by Dr. Raphael Uwejigho from the Anatomy Department (Psychosocial stress and fertility: Potentials of Vitamin E as evidenced from the testes and epididymis) was adjudged the third best with a prize of \\$100,000 to be used towards the advancement of his research work.







He compared entrepreneurship to a door that leads to success, saying 'education is the key to the door while the entrepreneur is the door.' 'A lot of people in the medical field are not tapping into businesses. It is we, the entrepreneurs, that own hospitals and pharmacies, while we employ doctors. It is important that we open up these value chains so that they could see a breakdown of several opportunities that could be tapped into,' Dr. Francis stated.

He clarified that the idea was not to take undue advantage of people but to provide necessary services to the public and get rewarded for such efforts, saying a high number of Nigerians were bound to travel out yearly and that they pay heavily to get such services.


Dr. Francis advised UNIMED students to embrace entrepreneurship, engage in it, and be connected to business-minded people. He appreciated the Institute of Health Humanities and Entrepreneurship (IHHE), UNIMED, Ondo as well as the Management of the University for imprinting entrepreneurship in the mind of the youths.

The second keynote address at the event was delivered by Dr. Adebayo Adedokun, the Senior Special Adviser to Osun State Governor on Economic Planning, Budget, and Development. He spoke on 'expanding factors of entrepreneur education potentials for medical universities.' Adedokun explained that an entrepreneur is a person who can turn ideas into business in a creative manner.

'All entrepreneurs are businessmen but not all businessmen are entrepreneurs. This is because an entrepreneur inputs lots of creative ideas to make the business a success,' he stated.

Another highlight of the event was a panel discussion involving the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Prof. Roseangela Nwuba, Dr. Summy Smath Francis, Prof. Adeduro J. Adegeye, Dr. Iheanacho C. Metuonu, Mr. Dimeji Adeyemo, and Ms. Bukola Aladesulu with focus on entrepreneurial opportunities.

The program was well attended by the Management, staff and students of the University.



he University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo City, Ondo State has provided free medical diagnosis and treatment for members of the public as part of activities marking the 2022 World Hearing Day.

Speaking on the significance of the day, a Consultant Ear, Nose and Throat Surgeon who is also a Senior Lecturer, Surgery Department and Deputy Director, Centre for Health Profession and Biomedical Education, UNIMED, Ondo, Dr.

Immaculata Akpalaba said the day was set aside by the World Health Organisation to create awareness for hearing, hearing loss – prevention, cure and rehabilitation.

'3rd of March was chosen to celebrate the hearing day because the ear on each side of the face looks like figure 3, double 3 on the face and the only month that has 3-3 in a year is the 3rd of March. So, the World Health Organisation set the day aside to mark world hearing day,' Dr. Akpalaba stated.

She noted the theme for 2022 celebration was 'To hear for life, listen with care'. This according to her meant that for one to hear throughout one's lifetime, there is a need to listen with care and practice what is called safe listening, keeping away from loud noise. Dr. Immaculata Akpalaba said the number of

people with hearing loss kept increasing because commuters were exposed to loud noise and young adults make use of smart phones turning the speaker of their phones high. Quoting the World Health Organization, Dr. Akpalaba stated that by the year 2050, nearly 2.5 billion people were projected to have some degree of hearing loss and that at least 700 million would require hearing rehabilitation. She further stated that over 1 billion young adults were at risk of permanent, avoidable hearing loss due to unsafe listening practices.

A total of 378 individuals benefitted from the 2022 World Hearing Day medical outreach sponsored by the University while eleven different ear disorders were detected and managed accordingly.



he Management of the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED) Ondo City, Ondo State, under the leadership of the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi on Wednesday 4th May, 2022 commissioned a brand-new, state-of-the-art ambulance for use by the University community.

Addressing members of staff who were present at the commissioning, Prof. Fatusi said the University decided to purchase the ambulance despite the economic situation, noting that the welfare of staff and students is of utmost importance.

'The welfare of our staff is something we prioritise. This University started small but has grown because of the courage and commitment of the management and other members of staff who have been involved in the past and those who are playing that role now,' the VC stated.

He added, 'one of the choices we have made despite our financial challenges is that we must transform the spectrum of health services in the University. Along that line, we made a decision that first of all, we are going to ensure that students can get to our healthcare facilities rapidly, that is why we decided to buy a brand-new ambulance. This ambulance is very compact and has everything you need - stretcher, oxygen and other equipment - to sustain a patient being transported to the healthcare centre.'

Prof. Fatusi noted that the Management of the University will be replicating the same thing in Akure Campus as soon as possible, but that a utility vehicle has been approved to serve as an ambulance in the meantime.

'We are also opening up our new health center hopefully between the next two to three months. I want to thank God for what he is enabling us to do and to appreciate the leadership of the health centre for a good job,' the VC said.

The Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Administration and Clinical Services, and the Chairman of the Board of Health Centre, Prof.

Adolphus Loto, in his address, lauded the Vice-Chancellor for his support and effort towards the growth of the institution. He said the purchase of the Nigerian-made Innoson ambulance, for the welfare of students and

staff, is highly commendable at a time of economic crisis. He said, 'the purchase of the ambulance is better than using a personal vehicle to transport students when they have issues with their health.'
